

EVENT SAFETY PLAN

NASCC Ice Race Series

1.) Equipment list for Control Stations:

- Each marshal station will have at hand, 1-10lb. Dry Chemical “ABC” Fire Extinguisher, 1-20lb. Dry Chemical “ABC” Fire Extinguisher, large pry bar, shovel, flags for communicating to the drivers and a two-way radio (walkie-talkie).

2.) Medical Doctor:

- No Medical Doctor is scheduled to be in attendance at these events. Ambulance manned by EMT and EMR are used to attend to injuries and health concerns.

3.) Medical Staff:

- No Medical Staff is scheduled to be in attendance at these events. Ambulance manned by EMT and EMR are used to attend to injuries and health concerns.

4.) Ambulance Provisions:

- The “contractor” supplies special vehicles outfitted for use as ambulances only. The vehicles will contain equipment that meets the recommendations of the Alberta Ambulance Operators Association, Alberta Health Ambulance Services Branch and Alberta Occupational Health and Safety. For remote locations these are outfitted with cell phone and two-way radios and GPS to locate the ambulance for air transport evacuation. Minimum equipment will be for Basic Life Support (BLS). 2-EMTs, or 1-EMT and 1-EMR will man the ambulance.

5.) Emergency Services Vehicle:

- One of the “rescue vehicles” will be outfitted with a limited range of tools for use by on-site personnel; these include fire extinguishers, crowbars, hacksaws, bolt cutters, wrenches and a hydraulic floor jack.
- If the wreck is considered to potentially exceed our capabilities the closest Fire Department will be called to assist.

6.) Mobile Fire Fighting Equipment:

- Fire Response:
 - a car fire or any other fire will be handled on a first response basis by the marshals. Available are, small (10lb.) and larger (20lb) Dry Chemical “ABC” Fire Extinguishers.
 - one of the “rescue vehicles” will be outfitted with some of the 10 and 20 lb. Dry Chemical Extinguishers to act as back-up and second response to the Marshal Station’s first response to a fire.
 - if the fire is considered to potentially exceed our capabilities to control, the nearest Fire Department will be called to assist.

7.) Driver Rescue/Extraction Equipment:

- Extrication in a severe incident where a driver is trapped:
 - a limited range of tools are available for use by on site personnel, these include crowbars, hacksaws, bolt cutters, wrenches and a hydraulic floor jack.
 - if the wreck is considered to potentially exceed our capabilities the closest Fire Department will be called to assist.

8.) Personal Injury including Spectators:

1. Emergency Medical Responders with a Basic Life Support equipped Ambulance are on site to respond to all onsite injuries to drivers, crew, family attendees and officials. These events permit spectators. Spectators will be given the highest priority for response based on a “triage” evaluation in the case of multiple injuries.
- In the event of a serious accident the Ambulance and EMRs will attend to the driver, in the car and on the track as may be required, once all racing has stopped (Red Flagged). If the injury is severe or if it is determined to require further care or treatment, the EMRs will determine if, a transfer Ambulance is to be called to the site or if, the STARS-Air Ambulance is to be used.
 - All other officials, participants and spectators will be dealt with in a similar fashion.

9.) Hospitals, Fire Departments and RCMP:

10.) RCMP:

- Should the need for the control of spectators or other individuals from the public become necessary, such as in the case of “Nuisance” ski-doo or all terrain vehicle operators, the local RCMP will be called to assist with this eventuality.

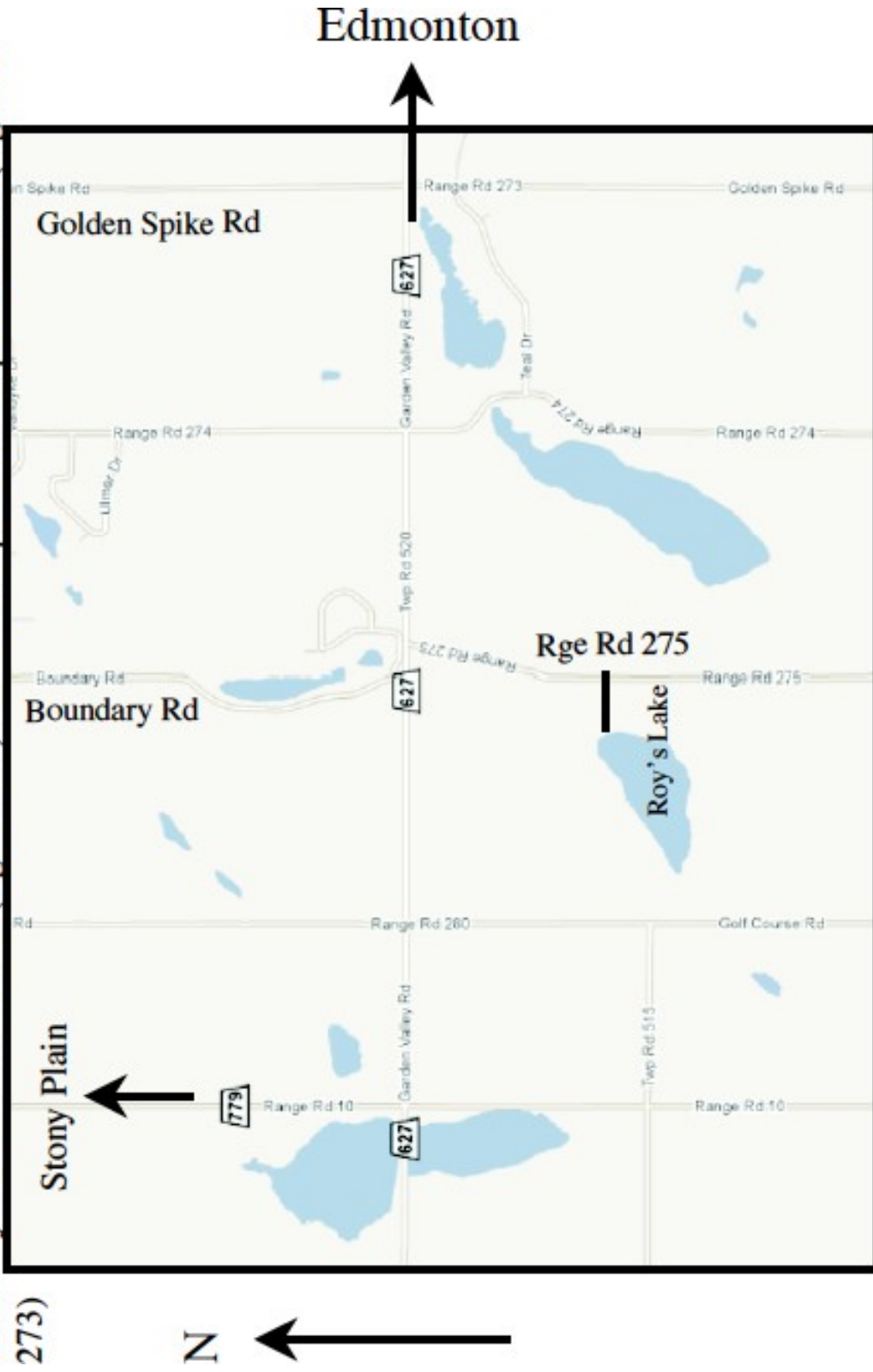
